

Spending Forecast, 1Q13 Update






2011 is the first year where we asked about Lean. We only had 40 respondents for this paradigm.




Requirement - We need some office chairs


Chair Specification

- Seat Pan Height: adjustable 16"-21" minimum
- Seat Pan Depth: 15"-17" with a waterfall sloping front edge.
- Seat Pan Width: 18"-20"
- Seat Pan Angle: adjustable 0-10 degrees
- Seat Back Height: minimum 14"






